Welcome!

For most of us, *Carmen*, is the hugely successful opera dating from 1875 by composer Georges Bizet.

Bizet's libretto was drawn from a novella by Prosper Mérimée. Set in Andalusia, the primary characters are Carmen, a spirited and seductive Gypsy, and Don José, a corporal in the dragoons, who is enchanted by her. Don José is obsessed, but Carmen will not be possessed. Mérimée refers to the "untamable nature of love" and establishes a tension between the two people. Carmen foresees the tragic conclusion.

In Mérimée's novella, he offers this explanation, "Carmen will always be free."

Choreographer, Liam Scarlett, finds the humanity in both characters. As with all great art, we identify with these people: we see elements of ourselves in each. His *Frankenstein*, staged by the Joffrey in 2023, shares this same empathy for the Creature, moving beyond the "monster" to reveal human emotion.

We miss Liam, whose life ended too soon. We remember him by presenting his creations. *Carmen* is the fourth of his ballets to join our repertoire.

I hope you enjoy the performance.

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SYNOPSIS

CARMFN

Micaëla has travelled from a nearby village to a cigarette factory to see her teenage sweetheart, Don José, in order to deliver a message from his mother. The women working at the factory are supervised by a guard, Zuniga. The atmosphere is tense. The monotony of factory labour is only interrupted by the changing of the guard. After Zuniga's departure, Carmen entertains the guards and notices Don José, throwing a flower to him. Micaëla finally meets Don José and their old feelings are reignited. The encounter is interrupted by a scream from the factory: a fight has erupted between Carmen and the other women. She is taken away from the others and Don José is assigned to guard her. To get away, Carmen seduces Don José, who is arrested for his negligence.

Carmen and her friends have taken refuge in a tavern. The famous bullfighter, Escamillo, arrives and seduces Carmen. The next day, Escamillo leaves and Don José arrives, declaring his love to Carmen.

Carmen and Don José plan to run away together and get married. Don José travels to the romani camp to wait for Carmen, but before leaving to join him, Carmen runs into Escamillo. He promises her a perfect life by his side. Carmen writes in a letter to Don José that she doesn't love him after all. Micaëla arrives at the tavern and she is trusted with delivering the letter to the camp. At the camp, Micaëla tries to talk Don José to follow her, but he professes his love for Carmen. Having read Carmen's letter, Don José falls into despair.

At a party to celebrate Escamillo's victorious bullfight and marriage, Carmen starts to doubt whether she should've ever got married. Don José still tries to convince Carmen to run away with him. Consumed by his passion, Don José stabs Carmen to death. Carmen dies in his arms.

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ASHLEY WHEATER MBE The Mary B. Galvin Artistic Director

Ashley Wheater has dedicated his life to dance. He was born in Scotland and trained at The Royal Ballet School in England. He worked with Frederick Ashton, Kenneth MacMillan, and Michael Somes in numerous ballets at Covent Garden, including Swan Lake, Sleeping Beauty, Giselle, Manon, Anastacia, and The Dream. Wheater danced with Rudolf Nureyev in Nureyev and Friends at the London Coliseum.

On Nureyev's advice, Wheater joined the London Festival Ballet and danced in his *Romeo* and Juliet and Sleeping Beauty. He danced in Glen Tetley's Sphinx and Greening and in Festival Ballet's large repertoire of classics and new creations. Under the artistic direction of John Field, he was promoted to Principal Dancer at the age of 20.

In 1982, he joined the Australian Ballet where he continued dancing principal roles in both classical and contemporary work, especially in the John Cranko full-length ballets.

In 1985, at the invitation of Gerald Arpino, Wheater joined The Joffrey Ballet. For the next four years, he performed various works by American choreographers including William Forsythe, Gerald Arpino, Mark Morris, Paul Taylor, and Laura Dean, as well as repertoire by Ashton and Cranko.

Joining the San Francisco Ballet in 1989, he continued his creative career working under Helgi Tomasson, and with choreographers James Kudelka, David Bintley, and many more. In 1997, he retired from dancing and was appointed Ballet Master and, later, Assistant to the Artistic Director at the San Francisco Ballet.

Since his appointment in 2007 as artistic director of The Joffrey Ballet, his passion and commitment to the Joffrey have been evident in the quality that he has brought to the dancing and to the repertoire. He has invited world-renowned choreographers, as well as fresh young talent, to create new work for the company. Wheater has added new full-length works to the Joffrey's repertoire, including Lar Lubovitch's groundbreaking Othello, Ronald Hynd's *The Merry Widow*, and Yuri Possokhov's *Don Quixote*.

In 2008, Wheater was the recipient of the Boeing Game-Changer Award in recognition of his commitment to community engagement in Chicago and to the celebration of diversity through dance. He sits on the Advisory Board for *Dance Magazine*, serves as the Artistic Advisor for ChiArts, and is the Advisor to the Arts for the Lincoln Academy of Illinois. In 2010, Wheater, representing The Joffrey Ballet, was named Lincoln Academy Laureate, the highest honor presented by the State of Illinois, and in 2013 the *Chicago Tribune* named him "Chicagoan of the Year." In 2015, Wheater received the University of Chicago Rosenberger Medal for Outstanding Achievement in the Creative and Performing Arts. In December 2019, he was appointed to be a Member of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire (MBE) by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

GREG CAMERON

President and Chief Executive Officer

Driven by his lifelong love for the arts, for his hometown, and for connecting with people from every background, Greg Cameron leads The Joffrey Ballet as President & CEO, responsible for organization-wide administration and strategy. Under Greg's partnership with The Mary B. Galvin Artistic Director Ashley Wheater MBE, the Joffrey has set new records at the box office and built the strongest financial foundation in its history.

His 2013 appointment was the culmination of three decades of work in arts administration and philanthropy. "I always loved art, but I wasn't a great artist," he says. "I could paint by numbers, or I could connect the dots. I realized early on I was a good dot connector. I could connect people to each other and help them get involved with the things they believe in."

As a child in suburban Chicago, Greg ran a makeshift theater out of his garage and sold more mints than anyone else for his local YMCA. And as an adult, he turned those passions into a career raising funds for the cultural organizations he loves. At the Chicago Department of Cultural Affairs; the Art Institute of Chicago; the Museum of Contemporary Art, where he rose to the role of Deputy Director and Chief Development Officer; and WTTW/WFMT, where he served as COO, Greg dedicated himself to supporting art and artists and to creating meaningful experiences for others.

"The Joffrey brings it all together for me," he says. "It's about collaboration, partnership with the community, honoring and supporting artists, and telling stories that truly move people."

Today, Greg leads the Joffrey's efforts to support unforgettable productions and new commissions, reach out to organizations and communities across Chicago, and open up world-class ballet for audiences from all backgrounds. Throughout the span of his 40-year career as an arts administrator in Chicago, Greg has volunteered for a wide range of nonprofit organizations and civic committees. He currently serves on the Facing History and Ourselves Chicago Advisory Board and the State Street SSA Commission. Greg was recently honored by the Association of Fundraising Professionals Chicago Chapter with their Benjamin Franklin Award, in recognition of the significant achievements throughout his long career, serving as a role model for his profession.





SCOTT SPECK

Music Director & Principal Conductor

With recent performances in London, Paris, Moscow, Beijing, New York, Chicago, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Washington, Scott Speck has inspired international acclaim as a conductor of passion, intelligence and winning personality.

Scott Speck is one of the most active conductors on Chicago's cultural scene. In addition to his many Joffrey performances, he is Artistic Director of the Chicago Philharmonic, and he has become a frequent guest for the Chicago Symphony's family concerts. He is currently the Illinois Council of Orchestras' Conductor of the Year.

Speck's concerts with the Moscow RTV Symphony Orchestra in Tchaikovsky Hall garnered unanimous praise. His gala performances with Yo-Yo Ma, Itzhak Perlman, Joshua Bell, Renée Fleming, Midori, Evelyn Glennie, and Olga Kern have highlighted his recent seasons as Music Director of the Mobile Symphony. He has collaborated with Carnegie Hall as Music Director of the West Michigan Symphony. He was invited to the White House as former Music Director of The Washington Ballet.

In recent seasons, Speck has conducted at London's Royal Opera House at Covent Garden, the Paris Opera, New York's Lincoln Center, Washington's Kennedy Center, Chicago's Lyric Opera House, San Francisco's War Memorial Opera House, and the Los Angeles Music Center. He has led numerous performances with the symphony orchestras of Baltimore, Houston, Chicago, Paris, Moscow, Shanghai, Beijing, Vancouver, Romania, and Slovakia, among many others.

Previously, he held positions as Conductor of the San Francisco Ballet; Music Advisor and Conductor of the Honolulu Symphony; and Associate Conductor of the Los Angeles Opera. During a tour of Asia, he was named Principal Guest Conductor of the China Film Philharmonic in Beijing.

Speck is the co-author of two of the world's best-selling books on classical music for a popular audience, *Classical Music for Dummies* and *Opera for Dummies*. These books have received stellar reviews in the international press and have garnered enthusiastic endorsements from major American orchestras. They have been translated into twenty languages and are available around the world. His third book in the series, *Ballet for Dummies*, was released to great acclaim as well.

Speck has been a regular commentator on National Public Radio, the BBC, the Australian Broadcasting Corporation, and Voice of Russia, broadcast throughout the world. His writing has been featured in numerous magazines and journals.

Born in Boston, Speck graduated *summa cum laude* from Yale University. There he founded and directed the Berkeley Chamber Orchestra, which continues to perform to this day. He was a Fulbright Scholar in Berlin, received his Master's Degree with highest honors from the University of Southern California, served as a Conducting Fellow at the Aspen School of Music, and studied at the Tanglewood Music Center.

MING LUKE

Guest Conductor

With the "energy, creativity and charisma not seen since Leonard Bernstein" and "vibrant," "mind-blowing," and "spectacular" conducting, Ming Luke is a versatile conductor that has excited audiences around the world. Highlights include conducting the Bolshoi Orchestra in Moscow, performances of Romeo and Juliet and Cinderella at the Kennedy Center, Swan Lake at the Teatro Real in Madrid, his English debut at Sadler's Wells with Birmingham Royal, conducting Dvorak's Requiem in Dvorak Hall in Prague, recording scores for a Coppola film, multiple Asian cultural programs with the San Francisco Symphony, and over a hundred and fifty performances at the San Francisco War Memorial with San Francisco Ballet. Luke has soloed as a pianist with Pittsburgh Symphony, Sacramento Philharmonic, and San Francisco Ballet, and he currently serves as Music Director for the Las Cruces Symphony, Merced Symphony, and Berkeley Community Chorus and Orchestra; Music Director and Principal Conductor of the Nashville Ballet, Education Conductor and Director for the Berkeley Symphony; and Principal Guest Conductor for the San Francisco Ballet. Long time critic Allan Ulrich of the San Francisco Chronicle said, "Ming Luke delivered the best live theater performance I've ever heard of [Prokofiev's Romeo and Juliet]" and in 2016 Luke's War Requiem was named best choral performance of 2016 in the San Francisco Bay Area.

Luke is proud to cultivate a dynamic career in both symphonic and theatrical conducting, and has conducted hundreds of opera and ballet performances worldwide. He has performed and collaborated with some of the world's leading singers, including Sylvia McNair, Christian Van Horn, Nicolas Phan, Kiera Duffy, Erie Mills, Kevin Short, and Monica Yunus, to name a few. Sylvia McNair remarked that "Ming is a very talented musician and conductor... when Ming was in charge of something, anything, I knew I had no worries." His recent performances with members of the Metropolitan Opera orchestra at Classical Tahoe were broadcast on PBS. Passionate about collaboration with dance companies and deepening the impact of movement to live music, Luke has collaborated with many of the world's leading choreographers, including Mark Morris, Christopher Wheeldon, Justin Peck, Alexei Ratmansky, Cathy Marston, Benjamin Millepied, David Dawson, and more. Luke has guested with Boston Ballet, Houston Ballet, New York City Ballet Orchestra, Cincinnati Ballet, Nashville Symphony/Ballet, San Diego Ballet and others and conducted l'Orchestre Prométhée in Paris as part of San Francisco Ballet's residency with Les Etés de la Danse. Famed dancer Natalia Makarova stated, "Ming has a mixture of pure musicality and a sensitivity to needs of the dancers, which are such rare qualities."

Luke has been recognized nationally for his work with music education and has designed and conducted over 150 education concerts and programs with organizations such as the Berkeley Symphony, Houston Symphony, Sacramento Philharmonic, San Francisco Opera and others. Luke has served on grant panels for the National Endowment of the Arts and the Grants and Cultural Committee of the Sacramento Metropolitan Arts Commission. An exciting pops conductor, Luke has created and conducted a variety of pops concerts in many venues, from baseball stadiums, to picnics in the park with over 4,000 people in attendance, traditional concert halls and recording for Major League Baseball.

Ming Luke holds a Master of Fine Arts in Conducting from Carnegie Mellon University and a Bachelor of Music in Music Education and Piano Pedagogy from Westminster Choir College of Rider University.





LIAM SCARLETT Choreographer

(1986–2021) English choreographer Liam Scarlett was The Royal Ballet's Artist in Residence. His works for The Royal Ballet includes *Despite, Vayamos al Diablo, Consolations* and *Liebestraum* (nominated for a Critics' Circle Award), *Asphodel Meadows* (nominated for a South Bank Award and an Olivier Award, and winner of a Critics' Circle National Dance Award), *Sweet Violets, 'Diana and Actaeon'* in *Metamorphosis: Titian 2012, Hansel and Gretel, Jubilee pas de deux* (in celebration of HM The Queen's Diamond Jubilee), *The Age of Anxiety, Summertime, Frankenstein* (a co-production with San Francisco Ballet) and Symphonic Dances. In the 2017/18 Season, he produced a new production of *Swan Lake* for The Royal Ballet.

Scarlett was born in Ipswich and trained at the Linda Shipton School of Dancing before joining The Royal Ballet School, White Lodge. While at the School he won both the Kenneth MacMillan and Ursula Moreton Choreographic Awards and was the first recipient of the De Valois Trust Fund Choreographers' Award. He graduated into The Royal Ballet in 2005, promoted to First Artist in 2008. He retired as a dancer in 2012, that year becoming The Royal Ballet's first Artist in Residence.

Scarlett's work for other companies includes No Man's Land (English National Ballet), Gargoyles and Funérailles (New York City Ballet), With a Chance of Rain (American Ballet Theatre), Vespertine, The Firebird and Carmen (Norweign National Ballet), A Midsummer Night's Dream (Royal New Zealand Ballet and Queensland Ballet), Viscera and Euphotic (Miami City Ballet), Hummingbird (San Francisco Ballet), Promenade Sentimentale (K-Ballet), Serpent (BalletBoyz: The Talent) and Hinterland and Indigo Children (Ballet Black). In 2016, he was appointed Artistic Associate at Queensland Ballet, created Fearful Symmetries (San Francisco Ballet), and made his first main stage full-length production for The Royal Ballet Frankenstein (a co-production with San Francisco Ballet). In 2018, Scarlett created the closing ceremony for the Commonwealth Games, The Queen of Spades (Royal Danish Ballet), a new Swan Lake for The Royal Ballet, and choreographed for Disney's motion picture The Nutcracker and the Four Realms. In 2019, he created his first full-length work for Queensland Ballet, Dangerous Liaisons, as well as a one-act commission for San Francisco Ballet, Die Toteninsel.





GEORGES BIZET Composer

Georges Bizet is considered to be a great French opera composer. Both of his parents were professional musicians. Georges' mother was a pianist. Georges' father was a composer and a singing teacher and gave Georges his first music lessons at the age of 4.

Georges' talent for music was displayed early in his childhood. When Georges was 9, he entered the Paris Conservatory of Music. He studied harmony and composition and took lessons on the piano and the organ. He was considered a master of the piano at age 14, won a First Prize for piano, and was encouraged to write compositions for the piano. He wrote "Jeux d'enfants," a suite for piano featuring four hands (two people playing the same piano), as well as 150 other compositions for the piano. He won several awards while at the conservatory: the Offenbach First Prize for comic opera and also the Grand Prix de Rome in 1857.

Georges went on to study in Italy, but returned to Paris to teach music. He composed music for a play by Daudet, called *L'Arlesienne*. This music is still popular today as a suite for orchestra. In 1875, he wrote *Carmen*, a four-act opera. The opera was based on a story by Merimee. Georges incorporated Spanish rhythms in his music specifically to set the stage for the story. Georges also composed a symphony, orchestral suites, other operas, and songs. His masterpiece, *Carmen*, is performed all over the world.





MARTIN YATES Orchestration

Martin Yates made his Royal Opera House debut in 2004 conducting Agon. He has conducted there regularly since in repertoire to include Manon, Mayerling, L'invitation au Voyage, Swan Lake, Romeo and Juliet, The Seven Deadly Sins, Don Quixote and Carmen.

For The Royal Ballet he created the new orchestration for Kenneth MacMillan's classic *Manon* (2011), composed Will Tuckett's *Elizabeth* (2016), as well as arranging and orchestrating Carlos Acosta's new productions of *Don Quixote* (2013) and *Carmen* (2015).

For Liam Scarlett he arranged and orchestrated *Carmen* (Norwegian National Ballet 2015), *The Queen of Spades* (Royal Danish Ballet 2018) and *Dangerous Liaisons* (Queensland Ballet 2019). He also arranged and orchestrated Gregory Dean's *Blixen* (Royal Danish Ballet 2019), Will Tuckett's *The Tragedy of Macbeth* (Japan National Ballet 2022) as well as orchestrating Kenneth MacMillan's *The Scandal at Mayerling* (Scottish Ballet 2021), Hans Van Manen's *Four Schumann Pieces* (Dutch National Ballet 2002) and Will Tuckett's *The Nutcracker* (Japan National Ballet 2025).

Yates studied as a pianist, composer and conductor. He has conducted all the UK's symphony orchestras, the important European orchestras as well as the major orchestras of Australia, Japan and China. He has made over one hundred recordings, mainly on the Dutton Epoch label, and is best known for his recordings of British and neglected French music.

His important orchestrations and completions include Vaughan Williams Fat Knight, The Bluebird, Henry V Overture, Scott of the Antarctic (complete score) 49th Parallel (complete score), The Future, The Steersman, Elgar Pageant of Empire, Spanish Lady Suite, Richard Arnell Symphony no.7, John Ireland Sarnia, A Downland Suite, Cyril Scott Piano Concerto & Cello Concerto, the ballet Callirohe by Cecile Chaminade, Mendelssohn Piano Concerto in E, and most famously EJ Moeran's Symphony no.2.





JON BAUSOR

Costume and Scenic Designer

Jon is a multi award winning international stage designer and creative director based in London. He designed the opening ceremony of the 2012 Paralympic Games in London and was nominated for an Emmy award in 2022 for Best Production Design on the Redbull film, Human Pinball.

Jon trained as a singer and cellist at the Royal Academy of Music and Oxford University before retraining on the Motley Theatre Design Course graduating as a Linbury Prize finalist in 2000. Since then he has designed extensively in dance, opera and theatre for companies worldwide including the Royal Opera House, the Royal National Theatre, National Theatres of Scotland and Wales, Abbey Theatre, Dublin, Toho Stage, Japan, both Finnish and Norwegian National Ballets and for many Broadway and London/ West End stages. He is an associate artist of the Royal Shakespeare Company.
