Welcome to Don Quixote!

Miguel de Cervantes first penned *Don Quixote* over four centuries ago. In the intervening years, the story has been identified as a comic novel, a social commentary, and a parable. Most versions of the ballet focus on the escapades of the barber Basilio, and his romantic attraction to Kitri. Choreographer, Yuri Possokhov, decided to refocus our attention on Don Quixote.

Why do we return to *Don Quixote*? Some may think of an unhinged man fighting windmills. Within the contradictions of his character, we discover a person struggling to perfect himself. Four centuries later, our challenge is not so different. Sometimes, we need to be inspired! Don Quixote may not be triumphant, but he is true.

Don Quixote was my first new full-length commission as artistic director of the Joffrey. We created this ballet on a dream and a shoestring. We refreshed a classic, telling a familiar story in a new way. This has been our vision at the Joffrey: to tell stories which resonate with 21st-century audiences. It is my hope that ballet can bridge between the seventeenth century and today, understanding that the passage of time has not fundamentally changed who we are as people.

As we learn from *Don Quixote*, not everything is possible, but nothing is possible without dreams.

DON QUIXOTE

ACT I, SCENE I, DON QUIXOTE'S BED CHAMBER

The dashing village barber, Basilio, is giving Don Quixote a shave. After flirting with the housekeeper, Basilio's harmless affections are rebuffed and he is dispatched from the chamber. The housekeeper delivers a book of chivalry to Don Quixote, and continues with her chores.

Absorbed by tales of conquest and heroism, Don Quixote fancies that he is a knight-errant. He dreams of noble crusades, slaying monsters, courtly tournaments, and the love of a fair maiden, Dulcinea. Engrossed in the travels of his mind, Don Quixote drifts into sleep.

A simple peasant, Sancho Panza, rushes into the chamber carrying a stolen ham. He seeks refuge beneath Don Quixote's table. The housekeeper re-enters in pursuit of the thief. In the commotion resulting from her search, she awakens Don Quixote. Sancho Panza emerges from under the table, cowering with the ham in his arm.

Don Quixote envisions a series of noble ventures, and convinces Sancho Panza to be his squire. Don Quixote arms himself, and along with his haggard horse, Rocinante, they set off in search of adventure and romance.

ACT I, SCENE 2, THE VILLAGE PLAZA, IN FRONT OF LORENZO'S INN

It is market day in the village plaza. Lorenzo, the inn keeper, has a beautiful and spirited daughter, Kitri. Basilio, the barber, enters the plaza pursuing his courtship of Kitri. Lorenzo catches the pair in an embrace, and forbids them to meet again. Lorenzo plans a marriage between Kitri and Gamache, an older, wealthy nobleman. The pompous Gamache emerges from his house, expressing his affection for Kitri. Lorenzo is delighted at the prospect of such a high-born son-in-law, but Kitri resists. The plaza is filled with people, including Mercedes the street dancer. They anticipate the arrival of the famous toreador, Espada, and his companions.

Before embarking on their quest, Don Quixote, Sancho Panza, and Rocinante pass through the plaza. This trio catches the attention of the bemused crowd. The people of the village torment Sancho Panza, playing games at his expense. Don Quixote storms to the rescue, brandishing his sword and admonishing the villagers for their uncivil behavior. Don Quixote glimpses Kitri, and is smitten by her beauty and innocence. She is the living image of Dulcinea, the girl of his dreams. Kitri asks the knight to dance. Gamache competes for her attention, with little success. While the townspeople celebrate, Sancho Panza steals a string of sausages, is caught and scolded by Lorenzo. In the ensuing clamor, Kitri and Basilio make their way from the plaza leaving behind the forlorn Lorenzo and Gamache.

INTERMISSION -

ACT II, SCENE 1, THE COUNTRYSIDE OF LA MANCHA

Don Quixote, Sancho Panza, and Rocinante continue their adventure at a campsite amongst the rolling hills of La Mancha. They sit near a fire, to ward off the cool night air. In the background, Don Quixote sees the silhouette of windmills. A storm builds in the evening sky, and as the air roils and lightning flashes, Don Quixote imagines the windmills as monsters and dragons. Despite Sancho Panza's protest, Don Quixote grabs his lance to engage these demons in battle. Don Quixote rushes towards a windmill, is caught in the blades and is thrown to the ground. Sancho Panza struggles to assist the injured knight, and the battered band make their way once again to Don Quixote's home.

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ACT II, SCENE 2, DON QUIXOTE'S BED CHAMBER

Sancho Panza and the housekeeper help Don Quixote into his bed. In his delirium, he is visited by Amore, a cupid reminding him of the healing power of love.

ACT II, SCENE 3, THE VISION

Don Quixote, intoxicated by his fever and a sip of a soothing elixir, is led by Amore to a world of mist and clouds, inhabited by Dryads and the Dryad Queen. Here in the splendor of his own dreams, Don Quixote sees a vision of Kitri, his Dulcinea, amongst the Dryads.

ACT II, SCENE 4, DON QUIXOTE'S BED CHAMBER

Back in his bed chamber, Don Quixote awakens from his vision with renewed vigor, planning his next adventure.

ACT II, SCENE 5, THE TAVERNA

The villagers are gathered at the taverna. Mercedes and Espada join the festivities and entertain the crowd. Kitri and Basilio have taken refuge with their friends, beyond the watchful eye of her father. Lorenzo, Gamache, Sancho Panza, and Don Quixote enter the taverna in search of Kitri. Lorenzo intends to complete his marriage negotiations with Gamache, sealing his daughter's unhappy union.

Lorenzo finds Kitri hiding behind her friends and compels her to agree to the arranged marriage. In dismay, Basilio pulls out a knife and feigns stabbing himself. As he slumps to the floor, Kitri drops to her knees at his side. Don Quixote tries to persuade Lorenzo to grant a "dying man's" wish: a parental blessing. At Don Quixote's entreaty, Lorenzo blesses the young lovers. Basilio jumps to his feet and the astounded Lorenzo swoons. The celebration in the tavern continues.

PAUSE -

ACT II, SCENE 6, WEDDING IN THE VILLAGE PLAZA

The plaza is decorated for a wedding feast and party. The people of the village gather in celebration of Kitri's marriage to Basilio. Don Quixote and Sancho Panza are included as guests of honor. Kitri and Basilio dance, and as the festivities continue, Don Quixote and Sancho Panza bid farewell to the wedding party and head home to prepare for their next adventure.

ACT II, SCENE 7, DON QUIXOTE'S BED CHAMBER

The story concludes, as it began, with Don Quixote in his bed chamber reading of chivalry, and dreaming of his next great quest.



DON QUIXOTE

- "Down in a village of La Mancha, the name of which I have no desire to recollect, there lived, not long ago, one of those gentlemen who usually keep a lance upon a rack, an old buckler, a lean horse, and a coursing greyhound...
- "...in his leisure moments, which composed the greater part of the year, [he] gave himself up with so much ardor to the perusal of books of chivalry, that he almost wholly neglected the exercise of the chase and even the regulation of his domestic affairs; indeed, so extravagant was his zeal in this pursuit, that he sold many acres of arable land to purchase books of knight-errantry, collecting as many as he could possibly obtain...
- "His imagination was full of all that he had read of enchantments, contests, battles, challenges, wounds, courtships, amours, tortures, and impossible absurdities; and so firmly was he persuaded of the truth of the whole tissue of visionary fiction, that, in his mind, no history in the world was more authentic."

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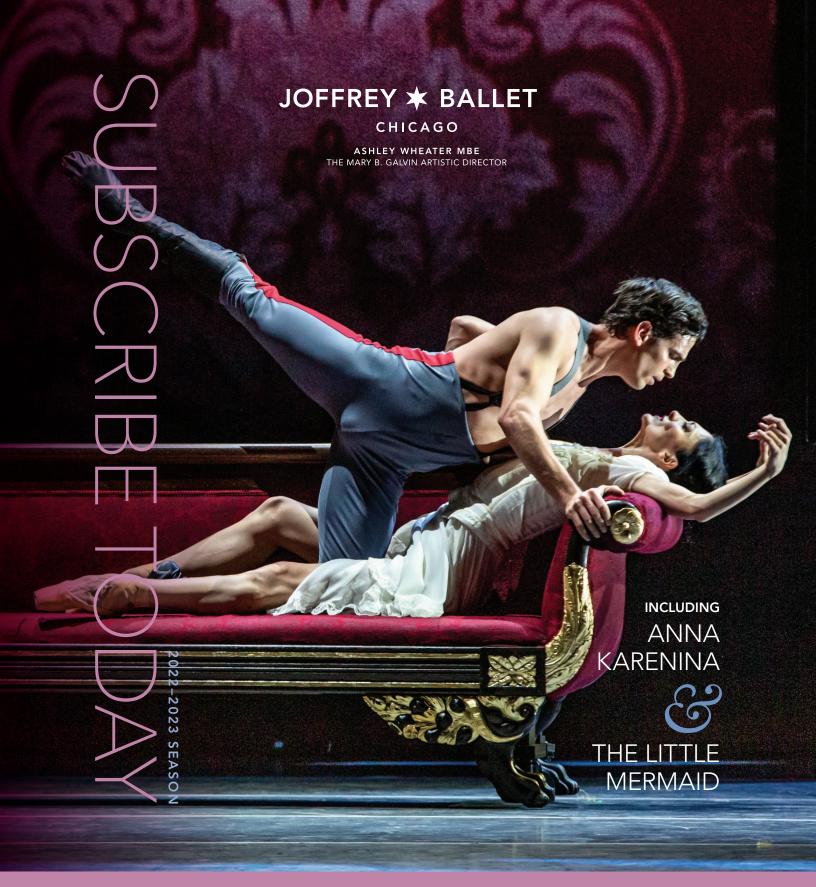

ASHLEY WHEATER MBE The Mary B. Galvin Artistic Director

Ashley Wheater has dedicated his life to dance. He was born in Scotland and trained at The Royal Ballet School in England. He worked with Frederick Ashton, Kenneth MacMillan, and Michael Somes in numerous ballets at Covent Garden, including Swan Lake, Sleeping Beauty, Giselle, Manon, Anastacia, and The Dream. Wheater danced with Rudolf Nureyev in Nureyev and Friends at the London Coliseum.

On Nureyev's advice, Wheater joined the London Festival Ballet and danced in his *Romeo* and Juliet and Sleeping Beauty. He danced in Glen Tetley's Sphinx and Greening and in Festival Ballet's large repertoire of classics and new creations. Under the artistic direction of John Field, he was promoted to Principal Dancer at the age of 20.

In 1982, he joined the Australian Ballet where he continued dancing principal roles in both classical and contemporary work, especially in the John Cranko full-length ballets.

In 1985, at the invitation of Gerald Arpino, Wheater joined The Joffrey Ballet. For the next four years, he performed various works by American choreographers including William Forsythe, Gerald Arpino, Mark Morris, Paul Taylor, and Laura Dean, as well as repertoire by Ashton and Cranko.

Joining the San Francisco Ballet in 1989, he continued his creative career working under Helgi Tomasson, and with choreographers James Kudelka, David Bintley, and many more. In 1997, he retired from dancing and was appointed Ballet Master and, later, Assistant to the Artistic Director at the San Francisco Ballet.

Since his appointment in 2007 as artistic director of The Joffrey Ballet, his passion and commitment to the Joffrey have been evident in the quality that he has brought to the dancing and to the repertoire. He has invited world-renowned choreographers, as well as fresh young talent, to create new work for the company. Wheater has added new full-length works to the Joffrey's repertoire, including Lar Lubovitch's groundbreaking *Othello*, Ronald Hynd's *The Merry Widow*, and Yuri Possokhov's *Don Quixote*.

In 2008, Wheater was the recipient of the Boeing Game-Changer Award in recognition of his commitment to community engagement in Chicago and to the celebration of diversity through dance. He sits on the Advisory Board for *Dance Magazine*, serves as the Artistic Advisor for ChiArts, and is the Advisor to the Arts for the Lincoln Academy of Illinois. In 2010, Wheater, representing The Joffrey Ballet, was named Lincoln Academy Laureate, the highest honor presented by the State of Illinois, and in 2013 the *Chicago Tribune* named him "Chicagoan of the Year." In 2015, Wheater received the University of Chicago Rosenberger Medal for Outstanding Achievement in the Creative and Performing Arts. In December 2019, he was appointed to be a Member of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire (MBE) by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.





SCOTT SPECK

Music Director & Conductor

With recent performances in London, Paris, Moscow, Beijing, New York, Chicago, San Francisco, Los Angeles and Washington, Scott Speck has inspired international acclaim as a conductor of passion, intelligence and winning personality.

Scott Speck is one of the most active conductors on Chicago's cultural scene. In addition to his many Joffrey performances, he is Artistic Director of the Chicago Philharmonic, and he has become a frequent guest for the Chicago Symphony's family concerts. He is currently the Illinois Council of Orchestras' Conductor of the Year.

Speck's concerts with the Moscow RTV Symphony Orchestra in Tchaikovsky Hall garnered unanimous praise. His gala performances with Yo-Yo Ma, Itzhak Perlman, Joshua Bell, Renée Fleming, Midori, Evelyn Glennie, and Olga Kern have highlighted his recent seasons as Music Director of the Mobile Symphony. He has collaborated with Carnegie Hall as Music Director of the West Michigan Symphony. He was invited to the White House as former Music Director of The Washington Ballet.

In recent seasons, Speck has conducted at London's Royal Opera House at Covent Garden, the Paris Opera, New York's Lincoln Center, Washington's Kennedy Center, Chicago's Lyric Opera House, San Francisco's War Memorial Opera House, and the Los Angeles Music Center. He has led numerous performances with the symphony orchestras of Baltimore, Houston, Chicago, Paris, Moscow, Shanghai, Beijing, Vancouver, Romania, and Slovakia, among many others.

Previously he held positions as Conductor of the San Francisco Ballet; Music Advisor and Conductor of the Honolulu Symphony; and Associate Conductor of the Los Angeles Opera. During a tour of Asia, he was named Principal Guest Conductor of the China Film Philharmonic in Beijing.

Speck is the co-author of two of the world's best-selling books on classical music for a popular audience, *Classical Music for Dummies* and *Opera for Dummies*. These books have received stellar reviews in the international press and have garnered enthusiastic endorsements from major American orchestras. They have been translated into twenty languages and are available around the world. His third book in the series, *Ballet for Dummies*, was released to great acclaim as well.

Speck has been a regular commentator on National Public Radio, the BBC, the Australian Broadcasting Corporation, and Voice of Russia, broadcast throughout the world. His writing has been featured in numerous magazines and journals.

Born in Boston, Speck graduated *summa cum laude* from Yale University. There he founded and directed the Berkeley Chamber Orchestra, which continues to perform to this day. He was a Fulbright Scholar in Berlin, received his Master's Degree with highest honors from the University of Southern California, served as a Conducting Fellow at the Aspen School of Music, and studied at the Tanglewood Music Center.

MICHAEL MORICZ Assistant Conductor

Michael's long career as a pianist, composer, and conductor for ballet has included significant associations with American Ballet Theatre, Houston Ballet, the Mark Morris Dance Group, Carolina Ballet, Pittsburgh Ballet Theatre, and the Juilliard Dance Division. He particularly treasures his conducting relationship with Texas Ballet Theater and the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra during the past decade. His commissioned orchestral ballet scores include *The Mighty Casey, The Ugly Duckling,* and *The Great Gatsby.* He's composed incidental music and songs for theatre, original scores for the Showtime, Discovery, Fox, PBS, and Disney networks and created special arrangements for such renowned artists as Tommy Tune, Chita Rivera, Marvin Hamlisch, and Renee Fleming. Michael is best known as the arranger and music director of Broadway's annual *Jimmy Awards* and as one of the music directors for the acclaimed *Mister Rogers Neighborhood* on PBS. He joined the Joffrey in 2017.



YURI POSSOKHOV Choreographer

Ukrainian-born Russian Yuri Possokhov is among the most active and imaginative choreographers working in ballet today. After receiving his early training at the Moscow Ballet School, he danced with the Bolshoi Ballet for ten years, working primarily with ballet master Yuri Grigorovich. During that decade, he was promoted through the ranks to principal dancer. In 1992, he joined the Royal Danish Ballet as a principal dancer at the invitation of ballet master Frank Andersen. The following December, Possokhov was cast as Prince Desiré in Helgi Tomasson's The Sleeping Beauty and, after being invited to perform in San Francisco Ballet's opening night gala, he decided to move west. In 1994, Possokhov joined San Francisco Ballet (SFB) as a principal dancer and spent the next 12 years as a dancer with the Company. In 1999, he organized and performed in a Russian tour entitled "Ballet Beyond Borders," with 16 dancers from SFB performing on the tour, which traveled to five cities throughout Russia. Following his retirement as a principal dancer from SFB, Possokhov was named choreographer-in-residence in May 2006. As a choreographer, Possokhov's early credits include Songs of Spain, choreographed in 1997 for dancer Muriel Maffre; A Duet for Two, created the same year for Joanna Berman; and Impromptu Scriabin, for Felipe Diaz. In 2000, he completed a new work for a dancer at the Mariinsky Ballet, as well as 5 Mazurkas for the Marin Dance Theatre. Possokhov's Magrittomania was commissioned for SFB's Discovery Program in 2000, receiving an Isadora Duncan Dance Award for Outstanding Choreography for this work the following year. Since 2000, Possokhov has continued to create a new work for the SFB each repertory season. Works include: Damned, Don Quixote, Study in Motion, Reflections, Ballet Mori, Firebird, Fusion, Diving into the Lilacs, Classical Symphony, RAkU, Francesca da Rimini, The Rite of Spring, Swimmer, Optimistic Tragedy and "...two united in a single soul...". Numerous works have been restaged with various companies in the U.S. and abroad. He is a frequent guest at the Bolshoi Ballet, creating several full-length ballets. The most recent, Nureyev, premiered in 2017 to critical acclaim. In 2019, Possokhov was invited to collaborate with Queen Margrethe II of Denmark and singer-songwriter Nanna Øland on a new full-length Snow Queen for Tivoli Ballet Theatre. For The Joffrey Ballet, Possokhov has choreographed Bells, Adagio, Don Quixote, The Miraculous Mandarin, and Anna Karenina. For more information, please visit yuripossokhov.com.



JACK MEHLER

Scenery and Lighting Designer

Jack Mehler's designs for Lar Lubovitch include Pentimento, Elemental Brubeck, Dvorak Serenade, Little Rhapsodies, and Jangle for Lar Lubovitch Dance Company as well as Nature Boy (previously Love's Stories) for Hubbard Street Dance Chicago and Recordare for Jose Limon. For The Joffrey Ballet, Mr. Mehler designed Donald Byrd's Motown Suite and To Know Her as well as the 2007 and 2008 versions of The Nutcracker Suite (based on Tom Skelton's original design). A Chicago-area native, Mr. Mehler earned a BFA from the University of Illinois/Krannert Center for the Performing Arts and then an MFA from New York University/Tisch School of the Arts. Based in New York for the last 19 years, Mr. Mehler designs lighting and/or scenery for an exciting mix of dance, musicals, plays and commercial projects for groups such as Alvin Ailey American Dance Theatre, Ballet Florida, Ballet Memphis, Buglisi-Foreman Dance, Donald Byrd/Spectrum Dance, Capital Rep, Cleveland Playhouse, Freedom Theatre, Lyric Theatre of Oklahoma, Manhattan Theatre Club, North Shore Music Theatre, Norwegian National Opera Ballet, Paper Mill Playhouse, San Francisco Ballet, Seattle Rep, The Spoleto Festival, Syracuse Stage, The Working Theatre, and the WPA Theatre among many others. Mr. Mehler also provides Design Coordination/Owner's Representation for arts organizations building or renovating performance and rehearsal facilities, having recently completed work on a major project for a Minnesota performing arts school with a 3,000 seat amphitheatre and 23,500 sq ft year-round rehearsal facility.

TRAVIS HALSEY

Costume Designer

Mr. Halsey, originally from Springfield, South Dakota, received his BFA in Theatre Arts from the University of Nebraska at Omaha. Before his passing, Travis owned and managed his own costume shop, Halsey Onstage. Through his shop, he produced a multitude of costumes for various clients for shows such as: Disney's Beauty & The Beast (Paper Mill Playhouse), Electric Ocean (Sea World San Antonio), Nutcracker on the Indian River (Ballet Vero Beach), Shrek the Musical (Omaha Community Playhouse), The Wizard of Oz (Midwest Ballet), costumes for Marie, Standing Still (formerly known as The Little Dancer) and countless Mother Ginger costumes. His extensive experience in theatre and ballet comes from his time working for: Nebraska Shakespeare Festival, Omaha Theatre Ballet, The Black Hills Playhouse, Omaha Community Playhouse, Dominic Walsh Dance Theatre, Charleston Ballet Theatre, Houston Ballet, and Joffrey Ballet. Omaha Theatre Ballet is where Travis began designing for ballet alongside Mona Schlautman, learning the fine art of tutu construction. Travis received several prestigious national and local accolades for costume design, including two awards from the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts for outstanding young designer. More recently, Travis received the TDF Kitty Leech Young Master Award presented at the annual TDF Irene Sharaff Awards. Travis also found joy in teaching the fine craft of tutu making to loyal and dedicated students globally. Although he is sadly no longer with us in the physical world, he lives on through his students and the art they produced because of the passion and knowledge he shared with them. And whenever his costumes dance across the stage, it is then — if only for a moment — that he springs back to life.



WENDALL K. HARRINGTON

Projection Designer

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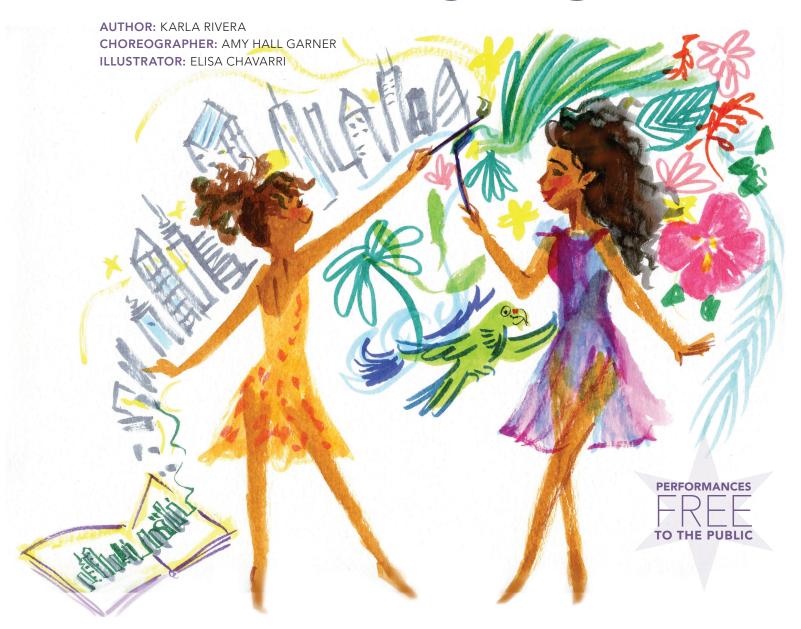
